

Undergraduate Cross Level Registration Policy

Addition to Bachelor-Level Undergraduate Catalog, within Section 1330:

Baccalaureate students may take up to a total of four courses during their time as undergraduate students at Georgia State during summer terms at Perimeter College providing they satisfy all prerequisites for the courses, have completed 12 collegiate hours at the 4-year campus and have a minimum institutional GPA of 2.0. Under extraordinary circumstances students may also be approved to take courses at Perimeter College during fall or spring semesters. Any such approved courses will count towards the four-course limit.

Baccalaureate-degree seeking students must complete a petition to be allowed to register for associate-level courses.

Addition to Associate-Level Undergraduate Catalog, within Section 1330:

Perimeter College students may take up to four courses at the 4-year campus providing they satisfy all pre-requisites for the courses and have completed 30 collegiate hours (12 of which must have been completed at Perimeter College) and have a minimum institutional GPA of 2.5.

Associate-degree seeking students must complete a petition to be allowed to register for baccalaureate level courses.

Rationale: Students at Georgia State and Georgia Perimeter College used to be able to attend the other institution as transient students. With consolidation this is no longer possible. The Consolidation Implementation Committee recommended that policies be adopted to ensure that this ability remained where it is appropriate to do so. There are times that 4 year students may need to take a class at Perimeter College. This is something that students have often done during the summer and it can support progression. There are occasions that Perimeter College students may want to take courses at the Atlanta campus to support progression as well; for example, if they are nearing completion of their 2-year degree and need additional coursework to remain enrolled as a full time student.
